These measures to limit smartphone use are of course not 100% foolproof; phone use will only decrease if we really want to reduce it. Not everybody thinks that phone use is a problem, and they argue that being constantly connected to the world is a good thing.

In order to avoid losing focus on other things, different measures have been suggested to limit our smartphone use a little. This takes away the temptation to simply click on an app because you see it. This could break the cycle of checking multiple apps when you might have just needed to check one.

Whatever you think about phone use, it is clear that there are ways we can control what we do with our phones. Everything can be good in moderation!

Evidence for smartphone use being almost like an addiction has been presented by psychologists, who say that, when not at school or work, we check our phones every 15 minutes or less. This means that we lose focus on other things that we do, whether it be homework, housework, or even something as basic as a conversation.

Another measure that has been suggested, one that is perhaps more unexpected, is to filter the colours on the home screen. Most phones allow the user to change the entire screen to a shade of grey. Psychologists believe that bright colours provide our brains with a small 'reward' so frequent checking of phones can provide this 'reward'. Removing the colours could remove the temptation for our brains to constantly look at phone screens.
